Kosciuszko Circle project is rolling out







By early autumn, thanks to support from the Neighborhood Improvement Development Corporation, Greater Milwaukee Foundation, and the Sweet Water Foundation, the following beautification projects will be completed in the Kosciuszko Circle project.

- New art has recently replaced the deteriorating art at the former Youth Art Pillars in the park at 7th and Lincoln Avenue. The art was created by the South Side Artist Guild.
- Urban Anthropology Inc., in collaboration with the University Extension Urban Agriculture program, installed lovely terra cotta planters in residents' yards and along the sidewalks of the Kosciuszko Circle. These were filled with plants and flowers.
- Urban Anthropology, in collaboration with the University Extension Urban Agriculture program, is installing 80 flower boxes on porch rails and windows in the Circle. These will be filled with lovely flowers.
- Urban Anthropology Inc. is installing a series of "little libraries" on the blocks of the Circle where residents can borrow and return books. The libraries will be built to look like area architecture.
- Urban Anthropology, in collaboration with the South Side Artist Guild, has designed new landscapes for 14 properties in the Kosciuszko Circle. All plants and trees will be delivered to residents within the next several weeks.

Picnic activities



- The South Side Organizing Committee (SOC) has received a TIN (Targeted Investment Neighborhood) designation for the improvement of facades in the Circle. This program provides City loans to property owners where up to 50 percent can be forgivable.
- Urban Anthropology has received funding for additional trees to be added to the Park. Thus far, this effort has resulted in 35 new tree plantings.
- Through Alderman Jose Perez and the Department of Public Works, a number of torn up streets, sidewalks, and curbs are being repaired.

Work may continue

UrbAn has applied to the Greater Milwaukee Foundation for additional funds to continue this effort next spring. If the proposal is supported, residents in all other homes in the Kosciuszko Circle will have the opportunity to receive free flower boxes, planters, façade/porch painting, and landscaping.

The Kosciuszko Circle includes the blocks of S. 6th, S. 7th, and S. 10th Streets between Lincoln Avenue and Becher Street, and Lincoln Avenue and Becher Street between 6th and 10th Streets.
