The Kaszubs of Jones Island



The <u>Kaszubs</u> are descendents of a Slavic tribe that settled on the Baltic seacoast. Most Kaszubs lived in small egalitarian villages in their coastal region with limited contact with the wider society. Many began

Population increased by 53,653 in three years

The US Census Bureau recently released statistics that show the Wisconsin Hispanic population has passed the Wisconsin African American population in size. Hispanics now make up 6.34 percent of the state's population.

Younger population

Between 2010 and 2013, the median age of non-Hispanics increased by about one-half a year, to 40.5. However, the median age of

Hispanics is 24. This is good news for the workforce, as Hispanics will be available to fill jobs in the future. It's also good news for future retirees, as it increases the potential for a large enough workforce paying into social security to keep the system viable. Statewide, the population of people 65 and older increased by 9 percent from 2010 to 2013 and that increase is projected to continue. Forty-three states saw their median ages increase during this period. Only the states of Alaska, South Dakota, North Dakota, Wyoming, Oklahoma, Montana, and Hawaii saw their median ages decrease.

emigrating in the late 19th century—some to the United States.

Milwaukee Kaszubs

One of the settlement areas discovered by early Kashubian arrivals was Jones Island off the coast of Milwaukee. The news of a vacant coastal area spread fast and soon the earliest immigrants were joined by hundreds of other Kaszubs.

The new arrivals organized a fishing village on the island, although few residents ever held titles to the land. By the end of the 19th century, the population of the island village was between 1200 and 1600 people. The island society was less complex than on the Milwaukee mainland. Even well into the 20th century, the villagers had few modern facilities on the island. Most relied on kerosene lamps and outhouses, and drew their water from barrels sunk in the sandy soil. As non-tax-paying squatters, the islanders received few municipal services such as law-enforcement patrols. They generally policed themselves.

Some art students, including Carl Sandburg, came to the island on sketching trips. Other mainlanders were known to boat across the river just to gaze at the islanders.

Eviction of the Kaszubs

The city condemned the fishing village in 1914 to build a sewage plant. One-by-one the Kaszubs and others began to move off the island. By 1920, only 25 families remained. Felix Struck, his family, and tavern stayed into the 1940s. All were gone by 1945.

Kashube Park and annual picnic

In 1974 the City of Milwaukee constructed a tiny park on the island to commemorate the fishing village, on the very site of the Felix Struck tavern. An annual picnic, attended each year by 70 to 80 descendents of the islanders, has helped the Kaszubs develop linkages and foster pride in their ancestry.

The 2014 picnic is tentatively set for Saturday, August 2nd, 11-3, at Kaszub Park on Jones Island and is open to the public.

Polish Heritage Award goes to Mark Pienkos

On Sunday, May 4th, Mark Pienkos was honored by the Pulaski Council of Milwaukee as the recipient of this organization's Polish Heritage Award. Currently, Pienkos serves as President of the Polish American Congress-Wisconsin Division.

Some of the reasons he was recognized were the following. This past September, Pienkos was asked by the Consul General of the Republic of Poland in Chicago, Paulina Kapuścińska, to organize the Jan Karski exhibit in the Wisconsin State Capitol in Madison. In addition, Pienkos worked with state assemblyman and state senators to have a Joint Resolution proclaiming the month of October "Polish American Heritage Month" in the state of Wisconsin.

Commemorating anniversaries related to Poland

The Polish American Congress-Wisconsin Division, along with many co-sponsoring Polish organizations, is organizing a very special program on Sunday, July 13th at the Polish Center of Wisconsin in Franklin. The purpose of the program is to commemorate and celebrate the many anniversaries in 2014 related to Poland. These include: 100th Anniversary of the birth of Jan Karski–1914; 100th Anniversary of the start of World War I–1914; 75th Anniversary of the start of World War II–1939; 70th Anniversary of the Battle of Monte Cassino–1944; 70th Anniversary of the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising–1944; 25th Anniversary of the first free elections in Poland–1989; 15th Anniversary of Poland's admission into NATO–1989; 10th Anniversary of Poland's inclusion into the European Union–2004.

Performance

Concert pianist Igor Lipinski will perform several Chopin pieces at the event. Professor of History Neal Pease from the University of Wisconsin- Milwaukee will also speak on the importance of these anniversaries. The program begins at 3:00 p.m., is open to the public, and is free.




