New release on city ethnic practices

Book demonstrates value of ethnicity to family and larger collectivities

In August, Lexington Books of the Rowman & Littlefield Publishing Group released *American Ethnic Practices in the Twenty-first Century: The Milwaukee Study* by Jill Florence Lackey.

Book result of 12-year study

Between 2000 and 2012, seventy anthropologists and anthropology interns interviewed 434 residents of Milwaukee County who were heavily involved in ethnic practices. The informants were asked about practices relating to language, art forms, organizations, food, ties to


past homelands, politics, genealogy, work, and healthcare and healing.

Study's major findings

The book is filled with direct quotes from people involved in over 60 ethnic groups. The sum of the informants' responses revealed "the plethora of contributions that are being made to wider collectivities through these practices—whether the collectivity is the nation, town, neighborhood, or family. Ultimately these contributions strengthen the collectivities and help support American society" (p. 97).

Chronicles change in attitudes about ethnicity

The book includes chapters about threats to ethnicity, including the removal of ethnic neighborhoods across the country due to freeway



building and urban renewal. Included among the informants' assessments of threats are changes in childrearing norms and the old melting pot ideology. The book chronicles the way attitudes about ethnicity changed after the civil rights' marches of the 1960s, and how the current metaphor was transformed from the melting pot (where ethnic groups were expected to dissolve into an Anglo-American pot and lose their distinctive flavors) to the salad bowl (where the ingredients were expected to retain their own flavors.

DNA study corroborates ancestors' oral history



A new study published in the journal Plo-SONE, reveals that tribes in British Columbia have occupied that area for thousands of years, matching their oral histories.

"It's very exciting to be able to have scientific proof that corroborates what our ancestors have been telling us for generations," said study co-author and participant Joycelvnn Mitchell.

The study

The researchers collected DNA from 60 of the indigenous people of the Tsimshian, Haida and Nisga'a tribes in the northern coast of British Columbia. This genetic material was compared to that of four Mid-Holocene individuals found in British Columbia's Lucy Islands and Dodge Island. The living participants were found to have mitogenomes that linked back to individuals living between 2,500 and 5,500 years ago.

You're invited to attend a German Stammtisch!



There's an interesting and lively group here in Milwaukee that meets regularly to talk German. Called a "Stammtisch," it honors the old German tradition of reserving a table at a Gasthaus or café for a group of local people. They get together regularly to visit, talk, play cards and have social and political discussions . . . and drink beer!

During early September, this modern version of the Stammtisch meets at the Estabrook Park Biergarten at 4610 Estabrook Parkway. It's informal—anyone can attend with no official membership necessary. There's no group leader and there isn't an official program. And it's "Dutch treat." Attendees pay for what they drink and eat. The only "rule" is that everyone speaks German. It doesn't matter what the skill level is—just come and have fun!

Who attends?

The people attending represent a mix of bilingual Germans, university students, foreign nationals, and Americans who want to improve their German conversation skills. It's an informal atmosphere where conversations cover travel, books, movies, news, politics—you name

it. Come and meet new people, practice your German and have fun at a gathering place here in Milwaukee.

Why we need immigrants


There are many arguments for and against immigration reform. One argument that is seldom refuted is the simple ratio of workers to retirees.

In 1940 the United States had five workers for every retiree. At that time the population was slightly younger and having more children than today. Today that ratio is three workers for every retiree—a ratio that threatens our Social Security system.

The Congressional Budget Office predicts that by 2025 the ratio will be only two workers for each retiree. For this reason the office recommend increasing the number of immigrants in the United States. New immigrants are statistically younger, giving the Social Security system a slightly better chance to survive.

Local play nominated for national award


