## A NEW LV AUTHOR

Juan F. Fermin was born and raised in the Dominican Republic, in the island's northern province of Santiago de los Caballeros. In 1996, Juan and his wife, Angela L. Fermin, had the opportunity to emigrate from the DR and come to the United States with the help of a relative. They lived in New Jersey for two years before finding better employment opportunities in Milwaukee. Today, Juan and his family live in a lovely house on 15<sup>th</sup> Place, in the southwest corner of Lincoln Village.

Juan has an economics degree and worked in accounting and auditing in his home country, and he has harbored a lifelong passion for learning. Reading, he explains, is his "pastime," and from a very young age, he has devoured books on subjects as varied as philosophy, astronomy, and poetry.

He recently finished his first book, in which he tackles "anti-valores" (or anti-values) in a framework that is both philosophical and societal. He uses this theme as a forum for denouncing both the government and the police forces in the Dominican Republic. Juan is unsure how his book, once published, will be received. But he believes that the most important thing is to be frank, because if you do not speak truth, you will accomplish nothing.

## SKATING THIS WINTER AT KOZY PARK



Juan says that finding employment in Milwaukee has not always been easy. And, though he is a great orator in his native Spanish, the language barrier he faces on the job market and with local institutions has been a constant frustration. He once had to fill out 14 credit applications to make a home repair—and none of these were available in Spanish! Despite this barrier, Juan is an involved member of the community. He has volunteered with a South Side organization in the past, and he is currently concerned for those residents who will be affected by the upcoming development of the Kinnickinnic River corridor. He believes strongly in the importance of the democratic process, even in small-scale endeavors such as block clubs.



## A BREWERY ONCE EXISTED IN LV?



Lincoln Village had its own German brewery at 2701 S. 13<sup>th</sup> St. on the Kinnickinnic River. It was called the Independent Milwaukee Brewery, but locally was known by its brand name, Braumeister Beer. The brewery thrived between 1902 and 1964.

## FOUR NEW BLOCK CLUBS IN LINCOLN VILLAGE

In order to develop a series of block clubs in Lincoln Village, Urban Anthropology Inc. has mapped the neighborhood into 50 clusters. This fall, staff have organized four new block clubs. The first is in cluster 21 (centered on S. 15<sup>th</sup> Place north of Lincoln), and the captain is Daniel Sanchez. The second is in cluster 22 (centered on S. 15<sup>th</sup> Place south of Lincoln), and the captain is Enrique Gomez. The third is cluster 42 (centered on S. 16<sup>th</sup> St. near the Kinnickinnic River), and the contact is Juan Fermin. The fourth is in cluster 3 (centered on 7<sup>th</sup> and Hayes), and the captain is Jill Florence Lackey.
