New public art slated for park

Urban Anthropology Inc. received a grant from the Mary Nohl fund to move ahead with public art for Kosciuszko Park. Beginning in Spring 2010, noted artist Juan Flores will create a unique piece of art that celebrates Mexican and North American Indian culture. The famed feathered serpent of Aztec culture will be depicted moving in and out of a reconstructed Indian mound. Anthropologists will bury prehistoric artifacts in the mound, as a symbolic way to give back to the many Native cultures that predated the arrival of Europeans. A second Youth Art Pillar will also be constructed, featuring the cultural history of the Puerto Ricans, Germans, and African Americans in the area.

Residents vote on the KK project

For over two years the MMSD and several nonprofit organizations have been planning the development of the Kinnickinnic River area, mostly in the Lincoln Village neighborhood. Urban Anthropology Inc. made a formal request to the MMSD to offer these alternatives to the Lincoln Village residents for a vote. On September 17, residents assembled to vote on the first step in the KK area development—the flood management plan. Residents voted for widening of the river and the removal of the necessary number of homes to accomplish this. Residents will have an opportunity to vote for additional steps in the development said MMSD Director, Kevin Shafer.

Prehistory of old south side

In September, archaeologist Kevin Cullen gave a fascinating lecture on the prehistory of the South Side at the Old South Side Settlement Museum. He discussed the mound building culture and the presence of effigy mounds at the site of today's Forest Home Cemetery and the Chase Mounds just west of the KK River. He talked about the different Indian villages that existed in this area at the time of early European contact, including the Muskego Village along what is today Lincoln Ave.



Beautiful Blocks II program
