Play slated for February, 2014

Urban Anthropology Inc. is now casting for the second in a series of plays about Milwaukee's ethnic history. The first play centered on the housing marches of 1967 and was entitled The March to Kosciuszko (now nominated for a national art award).

The next offering in this series is called The Follow-up, a fictionalized account of a Milwaukee newspaper's attempts to reinterview residents who were evicted from their neighborhoods in the 1950s and 1960s. The reporters themselves have conflicting opinions on the value of city development vis-à-vis razing ethnic neighborhoods. They ultimately are astounded by what they learn in their follow-up interviews.

The play addresses issues such as cultural diversity and the value of neighborhoods. The production, now being cast, is scheduled for February, 2014, probably at the Basilica of St. Josaphat. This newsletter will post more details and specific dates in the next issue.

Celebration of southside Poles at Kosciuszko Park

The efforts of dozens of cultural anthropologists working in Urban Anthropology's internship program played roles in collecting oral histories of the Old South Side during the last decade. This resulted in Arcadia Publishers' *Milwaukee's Old South Side*, to be released in the next month. Seventy cultural anthropologists and anthropology interns worked on a 12-year study of Milwaukee's ethnic groups at Urban Anthropology. This resulted in Lexington Books' *Ethnic Practices in the Early Twenty-first Century: The Milwaukee Study,* to be released in the next nine months.

Major events at Kosciuszko Park will be held for the public to celebrate these books.

Event to roll out *Milwaukee's Old South Side*

On Saturday, June 29, a host of local organizations and political leaders will hold an event called "Old South Side Day" at Kosciuszko Park. Exhibits will feature historical segments of this area's history. Free food and music will also be available.

Event to roll out *Ethnic Practices in the Early Twenty-first Century*

In spring of 2014, a host of ethnic organizations will sponsor an event that celebrates the totality of Milwaukee's ethnic heritage. Exhibits will feature the contributions of the groups in Milwaukee. Free food and music will also be available. More information on this event will follow in future OASIS newsletters.
